

PRINTED MATERIALS

This volume contains 20 fifty-minute instructional units (<u>Instructional Units</u> 121 through 140) designed for classroom instruction. Each unit contains the following parts:

Oral Material. The aim of this part is to maintain and develop the student's ability in oral fluency. New elements of the language are introduced for review and study in this part only. The style of this part is in conversational Cantonese Chinese. It is transcribed in romanization, calligraphed in Chinese characters, and translated into idiomatic English.

Reading Material. The aim of this part is to maintain and develop the student's ability in reading. No new element of the language is introduced in this part. There is a gradual development from conversational to literary style. It is calligraphed in Chinese characters.

Questions. This part is an informal check-up test of the student's ability to master the materials in the unit. It is transcribed in romanization. The questions and approved answers, calligraphed in Chinese characters, are in the Instructor's Manual.

<u>Vocabulary and Notes</u>. This part contains a complete list of vocabulary and grammatical notes which are intended for study by the student and support current or subsequent materials.

RECORDED MATERIALS

As the classroom supervisor or instructor available may or may not be a native linguist, each <u>Instructional Unit</u> is supported by one individual reel of pre-recorded tape designed to be used in a tape language course with a minimum of supervision. All tapes are for use on dual channel type magnetic tape recorder and are properly identified. Each tape contains the following parts:

Oral Material. This part contains listening and repeat practice.

Reading Material. This part also contains listening and repeat practice.

Questions. This part contains a number of questions.

Blank spaces are provided on the tape for the student to record his answers.

For <u>Instructional Units</u>, the following study procedures are to be observed when the classroom supervisor or instructor available is not a native linguist:

- 1. Listen to the Oral Material Listening Practice. Refer to the printed material, if necessary.
- 2. Repeat after the Oral Material Repeat Practice. Refer to the printed material, if necessary.
- 3. Listen to the Reading Material Listening Practice. Refer to the printed material.

- 4. Repeat after the Reading Material Repeat Practice. Refer to the printed material.
- 5. Answer all questions. Record answers on blank spaces provided between questions.
 - 6. Rewind the tape and play back for self-evaluation.
 - 7. If more time is available, repeat Step 2 and 4.

CORRELATED MATERIALS

Instructional Units 121 through 140 are to be correlated with 8 fifty-minute language laboratory practice units (Language Laboratory Practice Units 53 through 60) designed for individual practice. Each unit contains the following parts:

Aural Comprehension Material. The aim of this part is to maintain and develop the student's ability in aural comprehension. No new element of the language is introduced in this part. The style of this part is in conversational Cantonese Chinese. As this part is for aural comprehension, no printed material is necessary for the student. This part, transcribed in romanization, is in the Language Laboratory Practice Units.

Questions. This part is an informal check-up test of the student's ability to master the materials in the unit. No printed material is necessary for the student. The questions and approved answers, transcribed in romanization, are in the Language Laboratory Practice Units.

Instead of printed material, the student is issued an individual reel of pre-recorded tape designed to be used in a tape language course with a minimum of supervision. All tapes are for use on dual channel type magnetic tape recorder and are properly identified. Each tape contains the following parts:

<u>Aural Comprehension Material</u>. This part contains listening and repeat practice.

Questions. This part contains a number of questions. Blank spaces are provided on the tape for the student to record his answers.

For <u>Language Laboratory Practice Units</u>, the following study procedures are to be observed:

- 1. Listen to the Aural Comprehension Material_Listening Practice.
- 2. Repeat after Aural Comprehension Material Repeat Practice.
- 3. Answer all questions. Record answers on blank spaces provided between questions.
 - 4. Rewind the tape and play back for self-evaluation.
- 5. If more time is available, repeat Step 1, 2, 3, and 4, and/or record at the end of the tape a resumé of the Aural Comprehension Material.

- Major White: Sir, infantry has been the backbone of the Chinese Communist Army. Do you agree?
- Lt. Colonel Höh: Yes, indeed. The heavy dependence of the Chinese Communists upon infantry results from an abundance of manpower and shortages of artillery, tanks, communications equipment and transport vehicles, as well as of trained technical personnel.
- W: But shortages of equipment extend even into infantry units, with the result that they vary widely as to strength, fire power and organizational structure. Don't you think so?
- H: Yes, you're right. Rifles and other small arms are insufficient to provide more than about one-third of the infantrymen with these weapons. Service-type personnel, such as
 clerks, drivers and cooks, are used in combat as riflemen or
 litter bearers much more often than is the case in Western
 Armies.
- W: Do the Chinese Communists have paratroops?
- H: According to reports, the Chinese Communists are training a limited number of paratroops, probably infantry-type troops.
- W: Security companies and battalions are found in most Chinese Communist regiments, divisions and armies. What are they used for?

H: The security units are used to guard headquarters, supply and communications installations, and to fight as infantry if required.

- Major White: Sir, what do you think of the Chinese Communist field artillery?
- Lt. Colonel Höh: At the outset of their intervention in Korea, the Chinese Communists suffered from an extreme shortage of artillery. In addition, a marked diversity in weapons and a lack of uniformity in organization further reduced their artillery capabilities.
- W: I thought the artillery capabilities of the Chinese Communists had increased substantially, owing to receipt of equipment and technical assistance from the Soviets.
- H: That may be the case, but diversity of weapons still exists to a considerable degree. Artillery pieces in the artillery units are of varied manufacture, chiefly Japanese, United States and Soviet.
- W: How are the artillery units organized?
- H: The diversity of matériel has caused some variations in the organization of individual units. However, organization has been standardized to the extent that four-gun batteries, three-battery battalions and three-battalion regiments exist in a majority of cases. Furthermore, the organization and equipment of all batteries of a given battalion are uniform. Above battalion level, however, equipment of units depends on available matériel.

- Major White: How about other artillery such as antiaircraft artillery?
- Lt. Colonel Höh: The Chinese Communists were weak both in field and antiaircraft artillery when they intervened in Korea. Subsequently the antiaircraft artillery had steadily improved, both in quantity and quality. Apparently an antiaircraft machine gun company is now organic to each battalion in an infantry regiment. Some infantry divisions have an organic artillery regiment, which includes an antiaircraft battalion. These AA battalions employ antiaircraft machine guns and 37-mm AA guns.
- W: How about the antitank artillery?
- H: The Chinese Communists Army includes several antitank divisions which apparently have identical organization. Each division has three regiments; the regiments, however, unlike other artillery regiments in the Chinese Communist Army, do not have battalions. Instead, in each regiment there are six firing batteries of four guns each. Three of the batteries are equipped with the Soviet 57-mm M1943 antitank gun, and three with the Soviet 76-mm guns.
- W: How about the rocket launchers?
- H: There is at least one rocket launcher division in the Chinese Communist Army. It is composed of three regiments, each of which apparently is equipped with twenty-four 132-mm Soviet M13 rocket launchers.

- Major White: Sir, can you tell us something about the Chinese Communist armored forces?
- Lt. Colonel Höh: Equipment and training for these units have been furnished by the Soviet Union. The effectiveness of these units may be reduced by insufficient training of personnel, particularly in maintenance and communication.
- W: How about the Chinese Communist cavalry?
- H: The Chinese Communist Army probably includes five or more cavalry divisions. These cavalry divisions are smaller than their infantry counterparts, ranging from 4,000 to 6,000 in strength.
- W: How about the Chinese Communist engineers?
- H: Chinese Communist engineers are capable of bridge construction, road repair, mine laying and detection, and demolition. Organic engineer units are often used as infantry.
- W: How about their construction equipment?
- H: An almost complete lack of heavy mechanical construction equipment and frequent shortages of such rudimentary equipment as picks and shovels tend to reduce Chinese Communist Army engineer units to the role of labor gangs.

 Despite these limitations, however, engineer units generally have been able to substitute human labor for equipment and get their assigned tasks accomplished.

- Lt. Colonel Höh: Despite a minimum quantity of signal equipment and a shortage of trained operating personnel, the Chinese Communists have demonstrated the ability to establish and maintain communications. No detailed information is available regarding the organization and function of signal units. Organization probably varies according to the amounts and types of equipment available to individual units.
- C: How about the medical services?
- H: Shortages of trained medical personnel and of supplies and modern equipment limit the effectiveness of medical services in the Chinese Communist Army. Commanding officers of medical installations are usually loyal Communist Party members with little or no medical training.
- C: · How about the transportation units?
- H: The Chinese Communist army group may have an attached or an organic truck regiment. The army normally has two truck companies and an oxcart company, while the division and the regiment depend mainly on nonmotorized transportation units.

- C: What is the organization of a field army?
- H: There is considerable flexibility. Each field army is composed of from two to six army groups. Subordinate units of one field army frequently are detached and sent on independent missions with elements from other field armies. The troop strength of a field army may vary from 250,000 to 650,000 men.
- C: What is the organization of an army group?
- H: The army group is a tactical and administrative headquarters operating between field armies and subordinate
 armies. Each army group usually is composed of three
 armies, although the number may vary from two to six.

 This variation is caused by the shifting of armies from
 one army group to another whenever the exigencies of combat
 require it. The strength of an army group may range from
 50,000 to 150,000 troops.

- H: Special army groups may include: Artillery, armored and cavalry divisions; antiaircraft artillery and engineer regiments; and a security division. The types and number of these specialized units in the special army groups, however, vary considerably.
- C: Do the special army groups operate as an entity in the field?
- H: They apparently do not operate as an entity, but are attached, by element, to major tactical units for support in combat operations.
- C: What is the organization of a Chinese Communist army?
- H: A Chinese Communist army normally is composed of three infantry divisions, an artillery regiment or an artillery battalion, a security battalion and a reconnaissance battalion.
- C: What about the service troops at army level?
- H: Service troops at army level include an engineer battalion, a signal company, an army hospital and a transport battal-

ion. Armies are numbered from 1 to 70 and have varied in strength from 21,000 to 30,000 men.

Colonel Hoh: It is "triangular", having three infantry regiments, a security battalion, a medical company, an engineer company, a transport company, a signal company, and division artillery consisting of an artillery battalion and a 120-mm mortar battalion. Actual strengths of infantry divisions vary from 8,000 to 10,000 officers and men.
- C: How about armored divisions?
- H: Chinese Communist armored divisions are composed of two tank regiments, a motorized infantry regiment, a motorized artillery regiment, and separate supporting engineer, signal and reconnaissance units. Each tank regiment is made up of four tank companies, a transport company, a mantenance company, a heavy tank and self-propelled gun company and a submachine gun company. The strength of an armored division is estimated at 4,000 officers and men.
- C: How about cavalry divisions?
- H: Cavalry divisions, ranging in strength from 4,000 to 6,000, are known to exist in the Chinese Communist army. Little is known of their organization and armament.

- Lt. Colonel Höh: Although some divisions apparently have four regiments each, they normally consist of three regiments. The regiments are organized uniformly but are equipped with a diversity of weapons. Regiments are subdivided into three battalions, each having three firing batteries. In addition, at division level there are an antiaircraft battalion and a security battalion. At regimental level there is an antiaircraft company.
- C: The heavier artillery of the Chinese Communist army is concentrated in the field artillery divisions. What artillery do they use?
- H: It ranges from United States 105-mm howitzers to Soviet 152-mm gun-howitzers and United States 155-mm howitzers.
- C: What is the organization of a Chinese Communist infantry regiment?
- H: An infantry regiment normally consists of three infantry battalions, a heavy weapons battalion, a security company, a medical company and a reconnaissance and communications company. The heavy weapons battalion consists of a howitzer company armed with 70-mm howitzers; a mortar company with 120-mm mortars; a recoilless rifle company with 57-mm recoilless rifles; and an antiaircraft company with 12.7-mm antiaircraft machine guns.

- Major White: Generally speaking, what are the conditions of weapons and equipment in the Chinese Communist army?
- Lt. Colonel Höh: Weapons and equipment in the Chinese Communist army have been characterized by a lack of standardization as to type and quantity, and by marked deficiencies as to quality and quantity. Weapons and equipment within an individual unit usually include a wide assortment of types and models of varied foreign manufacture as well as of Chinese manufacture.
- W: Is each individual in a combat unit armed with small arms?
- H: No. In view of their general shortage of weapons, the Chinese Communists by no means attempt to emulate the United States practice of arming each individual in a combat unit with small arms.
- W: How many men in a Chinese Communist combat unit have apparently been individually armed with small arms?
- H: No more than one-third of the personnel has been armed with small arms.
- W: What is the quality of Chinese manufactured weapons?
- H: The quality generally has been considerably below Western standards. Much of their materiel, other than that supplied recently by the Soviets, is approaching obsolescence and generally has been in a poor state of maintenance.

Some are of United States manufacture, captured from the Chinese Nationalists during the civil war. Some were captured from United Nations forces in Korea. Some are of Chinese Communist manufacture. Some are supplied by the Soviets.
- W: What are the weapons and equipment of a Chinese Communist infantry regiment?
- H: Its weapons and equipment include 180 pistols, 400 rifles and carbines, 2.7 submachine guns, 60 light machine guns, 18 heavy machine guns, 9 12.7-mm antiaircraft machine guns, 27 60-mm mortars, 12 81-mm, 82-mm mortars, 4 120-mm mortars, 6 57-mm recoilless rifles, 18 rocket launchers, 4 70-mm infantry howitzers, few trucks, 150 horses, 30 carts, 5 telephones, few radios, 1 range finder, 2 binoculars, and 1 flame thrower.

- Captain Cheung: What are the "military areas" in Communist China?

 Lt. Colonel Hoh: To facilitate military and administrative control, Communist China is divided into six regional and two autonomous areas. Each of the six regional areas is known as "military area" for purposes of military administration, and as an "administrative area" for civil administration.
- C: By whom are these areas controlled?
- H: Each of these six regional areas has a regional civil administration directed by a "Military & Administrative committee", and a regional military administration directed by a military area commander.
- C: What is the relation between the military administration and civil administration?
- H: Military commanders of the military areas are also usually the chairmen of the civil administration of the same region.
- C: Military area commanders in three regions also command the field armies located in their respective command areas. Is this true?
- H: That's correct. These concurrent commands and interlocking military and civil functions of military commanders are characteristic of Communist China, where top military leaders, who are also leaders in the Communist Party, rule the country.

- Lt. Colonel Höh: The military areas are divided into military districts, which usually coincide with provincial boundaries.

 Military districts are in turn subdivided into military subdistricts, which usually comprise four or more https://districts.nic.google.com/his/.
- C: What are the duties of the military district troops?
- H: The duties of the military district troops include antiguerrilla operations, assistance in recruiting for the Army, and accommodation and supply of Regular Army units in their area.
- C: The Province of Kwangtung (Canton) is a military district.

 How many military sub-districts are there in this military district?
- H: There are ten. Just as the military district boundaries in Communist China usually coincide with provincial boundaries, military sub-district boundaries usually coincide with those of special administrative districts used for civilian administrative purposes.
- C: What is the organization of the military district troops?
- H: Since one of the main purposes of the military district troops is to supply the Communist field armies with replacements, it seems logical that there is fairly close liaison between them and therefore, that their general pattern of organization and administrative procedure is quite similar.

- Lt. Colonel Hoh: The mission of the People's Militia has been officially described as follows: "To maintain order, lay the foundation for national mobilization and prepare for the enforcement of an obligatory military system at the appropriate moment".
- C: What is the primary function of the People's Militia?
- H: The primary function of the People's Militia is the recruitment and partial training of reserves for the regular forces (both the field forces and military district troops) and secondarily, to preserve local order and to control local populace.
- C: What is the strength of the militia?
- H: It is estimated at about six million men, ranging from 18 to 46 years of age.
- C: What is the organization of the militia?
- H: The organization of the militia generally parallels that of the provincial civil administration and of the military districts.
- C: What are the equipment and training of the militia?
- H: The militia are equipped with a variety of weapons. They receive varied periods of training, usually of about two or three months.

- Captain Cheung: Sir, can you tell us something about the mobilization of the Chinese Communist forces?
- Lt. Colonel Hoh: In 1952, the Chinese Communist forces consisted of approximately 3.5 million men in the regular forces, of which nearly 2 million were in the regular field forces and 1.5 million were military district troops. In addition to these regular forces, the militia, an irregular force, numbered about 6 million men.
- C: Do they have any difficulty in mobilization?
- H: There is no problem as far as manpower is concerned. However, unless outside sources of supply are available, inability to equip and supply large numbers of additional troops does place a definite ceiling on maximum mobilization.
- C: What are their plans for mobilization in the future?
- H: Their plans for full-scale mobilization in the future apparently center around further development of the militia program. There are indications that the Chinese Communists hope eventually to reach a goal of over 20 million in the militia.

- Captain Cheung: What is the Chinese Communist conscription system?
- Lt. Colonel Höh: A registration of manpower conducted by local administrative authorities determines the number of men available for military service. The age range of those conscripted is from 15 years up, depending upon the locality and the number required to fill a particular quota.
- C: Who may be exempted from military service?
- H: Persons exempt from military service include the physically disabled, the principal "breadwinner" in individual families, and perhaps one or two sons of a family in which several are eligible.
- C: How are recruiting campaigns conducted?
- H: When a need for manpower arises, orders usually are sent out by the military authorities to civil officials directing them to institute a recruiting campaign. These orders are passed down to the local civil authorities who are responsible for filling the assigned quotas. Local civil authorities prepare a recruiting program which includes daily meetings with compulsory attendance for all eligible persons. These persons are told to "volunteer". Those individuals who have failed to "volunteer" are subjected to heavy pressure and threats. By use of the above and

similar methods, the required number of so-called "volunteers" are usually obtained.

Major White: Sir, when was the Chinese Communist Navy organized? Lt. Colonel Hoh: It was organized in 1949.

W: What kind of ships and vessels do they have?

H: This Navy acquired a small number of obsolescent, conventional navy-type craft by capture and defection from the Chinese Nationalists, but it is still dependent to a large degree upon improvised craft, such as Chinese junks.

Lacking facilities to produce modern naval vessels, the Chinese Communists must rely upon the Soviet Union for any modernization of their Navy.

W: What is the mission of the Chinese Communist Navy?

H: The mission of the Chinese Communist Navy is primarily a defensive one, with its main responsibility the defense of the coastline of China. However, it also must be prepared to conduct amphibious operations against off-shore islands.

W: What are the capabilities of the Chinese Communist Navy?

H: The Chinese Communist Navy is able to maintain limited coastal patrol and it can conduct reconnaissance by utilizing junks and sampans disguised as fishing vessels. The Navy is also capable of small-scale mine-laying operations.

- Major White: Is the Chinese Communist Navy capable of repulsing a modern amphibious assault?
- Lt. Colonel Hoh: Because of the lack of a sufficient number of suitable, modern combatant ships, the Chinese Communist Navy is not believed to be capable of repulsing a modern amphibious assault. The Chinese Communists rely, for the most part, on static coastal defense installations and ground forces.
- W: How is the Chinese Communist Navy offensively?
- H: Offensively, the Navy has demonstrated an effective strategy in staging limited amphibious operations on off-shore islands.
- W: What is the organization of the Chinese Communist Navy?
- H: The Navy was organized by the Army in 1949, and many of its top-ranking officers are ex-army personnel. The Headquarters of the Chinese Communist Navy is under the Headquarters of the People's Army, and it is departmentalized into several naval districts, each of which is responsible for coastal defense in its own area.
- W: By what are the Chinese Communist vessels powered? How are they armed?

- H: Yes, that's right. Probably most imported supplies are shipped via the Trans-Siberian railroad to Manchuria and then distributed via Chinese railroads to other parts of Communist China. Communist China at present has little or no capability to develop or manufacture the supply requirements of the Air Force.

- H: It is believed to be fairly high, especially because of the preferential treatment given such personnel.
